# Who are the IICSA Changemakers?

# How are the IICSA Changemakers formulated?



- 65 in total with 30 Organisations in the Steering Group a further 20 in a wider working group and 15 Organisations working with the Changemakers at an arms length capacity ( with others on our comms distribution list)

# What areas of work do IICSA Changemakers focus on ?



**1: The voice of the survivor** - The voices and experiences of victims and survivors were central to shaping IICSA's work and findings and remain key as we progress with the reports findings.

**2: Practice** - looking at our own practice and understandings as a collective that we could offer to other professionals.

**3: Policy** - hosting policy discussions on core IICSA recommendations and continuing to lobby Government for better provision for victims of CSA through the Victim's and Prisoner's Bill given IICSA's recommendation for a guarantee of specialist support for all victims.

# What are the asks of Government ?

1. The Inquiry has called for, the Government to appoint a Cabinet-level Minister for Children, because children deserve a champion at the heart of Government policymaking.
2. The Government must ensure the Online Safety Act delivers child protection measures to truly keep every child safe online.
3. The Victim's and Prisoner's Bill must be amended to include a statutory entitlement to specialist support for victims and survivors of child sexual abuse.
